



Onalaska Police Department Organizational Chart








Total Index Crimes




As defined by the FBI, Index Crimes include the following:


2012 to 2016 Offenses at a Glance




Burglary Offenses 2012 thru 2016



Assault Offenses 2012 Thru 2016




Larceny Offenses 2012 thru 2016




Property Crimes 2007 to 2016




Violent Crimes 2007 to 2016




Arrests 2007 to 2016




Traffic Contacts 2007 to 2016

2015 - 2016 Community Outreach

School Resource Officer

One Patrol Officer is assigned as the liaison to the School District. This Officer has an office at Onalaska High School. His duties include assisting the School District with disciplinary matters.

ICAC (Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force):

This is a multi-jurisdictional effort to detect and stop cyber-crimes directed against children. The task force often works undercover to detect internet predators that target our most vulnerable population.

Torch Light Ride for Special Olympics:

Volunteers from the Onalaska Police Department ride a predetermined route with other jurisdictions to raise money and awareness for Special Olympics.

Cops Gone Wild:

This is Special Olympics fund raiser in cooperation with Buffalo Wild Wings. Volunteers from the Onalaska Police Department and the Onalaska Police Reserves assist servers at Buffalo Wild Wings with a portion of the day's revenue being donated to Special Olympics. In 2015, \$3,222.39 was raised. In 2016, \$2,700.73 was raised.

National Night Out:

Onalaska Police Department hosts a Night Out Against Crime every year, which is held at the Community Park located at Quincy and East Avenue. The evening invites Citizens to take back their neighborhoods from crime, but also provides an opportunity for citizens to meet their neighbors and for the community to interact with members of the Onalaska Police Department. The program started in 2010 with an attendance of approximately 200 people and has grown over the years. The estimated attendance in 2015 was 2,000 and approximately 2,500 in 2016. The event has been designed to be affordable for all to attend. With the first event in 2010 it was a Turn Back the Clock theme, offering a hot dog meal for a buck. Those prices have not changed over the years. There are also games, inflatables, petting zoo, car show, water wars with the Onalaska Fire Department along with many other things to do. Everything is free except food and beverages. We hope to see you in 2017.

Santa's List

Santa's List is a program designed to bring children and their families together during the Christmas season and help make Christmas merrier for them. This program targets children from families that need assistance. The families provide a list of what each child

has on their wish list. The goal is to buy each child at least one item from their list. Those that attend are also provided a traditional holiday meal consisting of turkey and ham and all the fixings. Entertainment is provided as well. Santa always makes an annual appearance as well. This entire program is only made possible by those that give of their time and donations. Santa's List was attended by 99 children and their families in 2015 and 105 children in 2016. Santa's List also helps out families in need throughout the year, giving toys and gift cards to families that suffer tragedies.

K-9 Golf Outing:

The Dog Day Duffers Golf Tournament and Silent Auction, are the K-9 Units main funding source. The K-9 unit is funded entirely through donations and fundraisers, except for the Officer's salary. In 2015 we had 124 participants raising \$10,000.00 In 2016 120 participants raising \$8,300.00.

Justice for a Cure: The Onalaska Police Department working with citizens and community businesses to bring awareness, to Educate, to Support Cancer Programs & Research, to Support Survivors and those Going Through Their Cancer Journey, to Honor those taken by cancer.

D.A.R.E.

The D.A.R.E. (Drug Abuse Resistance Education) program completed its 26th year in the Onalaska Schools. D.A.R.E. is an officer led course that provides students with the knowledge and tools to resist drugs and violence. The program has an emphasis on decision-making, learning effective ways to resist peer pressure, and living safe and healthy life. D.A.R.E. is taught in the final year of elementary school which is a pivotal year in terms of students' maturity. Officer Leah Myers, the Onalaska Police Department's D.A.R.E. Officer completed her fourth year with the D.A.R.E program.

During the 2014-2015 school year, the D.A.R.E. curriculum was taught to 5th grade students at Eagle Bluff Elementary, Northern Hills Elementary, Irving Pertzsch Elementary, St. Patrick School and St. Paul's Lutheran School. There were a total of 257 graduates from the D.A.R.E. program. As part of the D.A.R.E. graduation, each student was provided with a D.A.R.E. card. These cards reward the students for their dedication to making healthy choices by giving them discounts to a wide variety of businesses. There are currently over 70 businesses that participate in this program and the vast majority are located in La Crosse County. The D.A.R.E. graduates enjoy the benefits of their D.A.R.E. card for one year after the date of issuance. We are so thankful for the generous support of all the businesses that participate in this program.

G.R.E.A.T.

The G.R.E.A.T. Middle School curriculum is taught to 6th grade students at the Onalaska Middle School. This curriculum is taught by Officer Matt Jahr, the Onalaska Police Department's School Resource Officer, and has a focus on decision-making, setting goals, resisting negative pressure, conflict resolution and gang avoidance. During the 2014-2015 school year, there were a total of 225 graduates from the G.R.E.A.T. Middle School program.

Fundraisers

Summer Activities

In the summer of 2015 Officer Myers and Officer Jahr participated in Camp Send a Kid (CSAK), which is a camping experience for children ages 7-13 that are disadvantaged and otherwise would not be able to attend camp. CSAK is a collaboration between numerous organizations including but not limited to the Onalaska Police Department, La Crosse Police Department, La Crosse County Sheriff's Department, Family and Children's Center, Boys & Girls Clubs of Greater La Crosse, Boy Scouts of Gateway Council, Kicking Bear, and the La Crosse Tribune. The camp is provided free of charge to those chosen to attend. During the four nights and five days of camp, the campers participate in a wide variety of activities such as G.R.E.A.T. lessons, canoeing, arts & crafts, swimming, archery with Kicking Bear staff, ropes courses, and team building exercises. This year the camp was moved from Camp Ehawee to Camp Decorah, the Boy Scout Camp outside of Holmen. There were approximately 60 campers who attended camp this year. This program is such a wonderful experience for all who attend and is supported by donations from our incredibly generous community!

Case Highlights involving Officer McCluskey and Czak:

Vehicle Sniff (OCN-15-2366)

A vehicle sniff was conducted on a vehicle that had been stopped in the south Kwik Trip parking lot. Czak alerted on the vehicle and a search of the car was conducted. Inv. Marcon located two counterfeit \$20.00 bills and the subjects were found to be in possession of drug paraphernalia as well as heroin and cocaine.

Building Search (Assist LCSO OCN 15-7943)

I was requested to assist LCSO on a building search for a subject that had a felony warrant. I was advised that they believed the subject was inside a garage. After several K-9 announcements Czak was deployed inside the garage and cleared the lower level. Czak was the deployed into the upper level where he located the subject hiding between boxes and actively engaged the subject at which point he was taken into custody without injury to any officers.

Passive Apprehension/ Building Search (OCN 15-10662)

Officer Robinson and I were dispatched to a trespassing complaint at a residence. Contact was made with occupants inside the residence at which time they began to attempt to flee. One subject was tasered and taken into custody and the other suspect fled into a lower level bathroom and locked the door. Czak was brought into the residence and K-9 announcements were given to the subject in the bathroom and he exited the bathroom and surrendered without incident out of fear of being bitten by the K-9. The subject had attempted to flush marijuana down the toilet while in the bathroom. Czak then cleared the rest of the residence looking for hidden suspects.

Tracking/ Active Apprehension (OCN 15-11217)

I was dispatched to a domestic situation, upon arriving at the residence I confronted a male suspect in the garage that fled on foot. The homeowner advised that there had not been a domestic and that no one should have been in her garage. It was determined that the suspect was burglarizing the garage. Czak was brought out and was scented off of the suspect's hat that he had dropped while running. Czak tracked the suspect through several yards and located the suspect hiding behind a truck waiting for officers. Czak actively engaged the suspect at which time he was taken into custody without injury to officers. The subject admitted to smoking marijuana and methamphetamine all day and was acting in a highly agitated state.

** It should be noted that Czak did not work a full year and was off from the end of July 2016 until January 2017 due to my being injured and placed on light duty.

Case Highlights involving Officer McCluskey and Czak:

16-1723 (Vehicle Sniff - Assisted Trempealeau Co. Sheriff Dept.)

I was requested by Sheriff Anderson to assist them on a traffic stop and to conduct a vehicle narcotics sniff. Czak conducted the vehicle sniff and had significant behavioral change and was attempting to crawl under the

vehicle and he gave a positive indication. The vehicle was subsequently impounded and I was later notified by Lt. Dahl that they had located 14g of methamphetamine in a magnetic box attached under the vehicle.

16-5100 (Area Search/ Passive Apprehension)

I was working a traffic grant when I copied radio traffic that a subject had fled from the area of Shopko on a retail theft and that Ofc. Proctor had lost sight of him behind Crossroads Shopping Center. I arrived in the area and put Czak on a long line lead and took him for a walk through the yards. Czak suddenly picked up the scent of the suspect and pulled towards a stack of firewood and a boat behind a shed. Czak went up on his hind legs and was pushing his nose between the boat cover at which time I peeled the corner of the cover back and observed the suspect laying down in the boat. I ordered the subject out warning him he may get bit if he did not follow my commands. The subject complied and was taken into custody without any further incident.

16-5521 (Vehicle Sniff- Assist LCSO)

I was requested by Deputy Amundsen from the LCSO to assist him on a traffic stop. Deputy Amundsen requested that I have Czak conduct a vehicle sniff on the vehicle he had stopped. Czak conducted the sniff and indicated and gave a final response alert on the vehicle. A search of the vehicle was conducted and located within the vehicle was .08g of methamphetamine, 18.5g of marijuana and a marijuana pipe. The subject was arrested on drug possession charges as well as a bond violation.

16-5584 (Vehicle Sniff- Assist LCPD)

I was requested by LCPD officers to assist them with Czak on a traffic stop in the city of La Crosse. Czak conducted the vehicle sniff and gave a positive indication on the vehicle. A search of the vehicle was conducted after Czak's positive alert on the car. The search turned up 1.7g marijuana, 7.g methamphetamine and numerous syringes.

6-8600 (Vehicle Sniff)

I conducted a traffic stop on a vehicle suspected of stealing a bait bike from UWL. The subjects were taken into custody and I had Czak conduct a vehicle sniff on the car. Czak gave a positive indication on the vehicle and a

search of the car was conducted. Located inside the car was 4.1g methamphetamine along with a digital scale, several syringes and several glassine envelopes used for packaging narcotics.



West Central Metropolitan Enforcement Group

The West Central Metropolitan Enforcement Group consists of the following counties; Jackson, La Crosse, Monroe, Trempealeau, and Vernon, which includes the police departments in those counties.

The theme of the WCMEG is multijurisdictional investigations of drug related offenses within our group, jurisdictions not in our group, and with State and Federal agencies.

The WCMEG is managed by Captain Wolf from the La Crosse County Sherriff's Department.

The WCMEG is funded by federal and state grants. A grant has provided an opportunity for a unit coordinator, Thomas Johnson and a data entry person to assist agencies in the WCMEG.

The Onalaska MEG has access to ACISS which is a DCI data base designed for networking on drug related cases.

Introduction

2015-2016 have been excellent years for the Onalaska Police Reserve Program. The Unit ended 2016 under the direction of Commander Erwin Chavarri, Deputy Commander Dave Villeneuve, Lieutenant Rick Vogel, Sergeant Dominick Jacobs, and Sergeant Shelby Palmer. In 2015, these leaders volunteered over 600 hours. Sergeant Tim Berg has served as the liaison officer between the police department and reserve unit for 14 years.

General Information

The reserve unit continues to be a volunteer organization and has a monthly meeting on the first Wednesday of each month. These meetings consist of scheduling, announcements, training, and team building.

The reserve unit receives training on a variety of law enforcement related topics. These topics include Defense and Arrest Tactics, Emergency Vehicle Operations, CPR, Firearms, Traffic Direction, Crime Scene Investigation, Crash Investigations, and Professional Communication Skills.

The Onalaska Police Reserve Unit continues to operate at a minimal cost to the City of Onalaska. The reserves charge an hourly fee for most of the services they provide. Reserve Officers are not paid and the group's proceeds are used to support the unit and the police department. This money is spent throughout the year on training, uniforms, equipment, and social functions.

The reserve unit continues the annual Chicken Q tradition. In 2015, this event raised \$1,935 and in 2016, it raised \$1,538. The fundraiser has become very popular with the public and is well known for its drive through service. In addition to assisting with Police Department events, the reserve unit provides services at co-curricular events for the School District of Onalaska. The unit also provides security for the Coulee Region Municipal Court. The reserve unit does an excellent job representing the City of Onalaska and the Onalaska Police Department.
