

**Great River Landing Committee
of the City of Onalaska**

Thursday, August 24, 2017

1 The meeting of the Great River Landing Committee of the City of Onalaska was called to order
2 at 5:15 p.m. on Thursday, August 24, 2017. It was noted that the meeting had been announced
3 and a notice posted at City Hall.

4

5 Roll call was taken with the following members present: Erik Sjolander, Victor Hill, John

14 **Item 2 - Approval of minutes from previous meeting**

15

16 Motion by Joe, second by John, to approve the minutes from the previous meeting as printed and
17 on file in the City Clerk's Office.

18

19 On voice vote, motion carried.

20

21 **Item 3 – Public Input (limited to 3 minutes per individual)**

22

23 Erik called for anyone wishing to provide public input.

24

25 **Joyce Diveley**

26 **711 Pleasant Court**

27 **Onalaska**

28

29 “Typically I would not read this presentation. But due to the limited time I thought it would be a
30 good idea because I only have three minutes. In the past years I have been quite active on city
31 committees and have served starting in 1992 until 2015. I was on _____ for the first version
32 of the Great River Landing, so you know my dedication to Onalaska, and I’ve lived here since
33 1974. As a former property owner downtown who recently sold _____ the middle of the block
34 lot to Dave and Barb Skogen for the hopes of spreading more activity to this area of Onalaska,
35 we now see that Onalaska is a pretty busy place. When the second phase of the Great River
36 Landing began, I decided it was time for us to have a chance to make that project happen, and
37 I’m so glad now with the way things have progressed. As construction began, I contacted Katie
38 about a possible sculpture in the plaza, and even offered to do some fundraising for it to happen.
39 She said it was in the far-off future, so I didn’t rush forward with anything, and that was
40 probably in 2016. Needless to say, I was a little surprised last week when I called the Mayor to
41 congratulate him on how nice the tree clearing was going on down by the waterfront, and also

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42 possibly about the sculpture. He informed me Harvey Bertrand was moving some things
43 forward and I should contact him. This brings me to why I'm here. The drawings Harvey has
44 shared with me, the ones I think you're going to see this evening, are done by the very talented
45 Michael Martino, who is a very talented local sculptor. I have the highest regards for Michael's
46 work and feel confident he would do a wonderful job. But I hope to encourage this group to
47 consider some other ideas also, or possibly put together a collaborative group – including
48 Michael – to move the sculpture forward. I would like to ask you to put on the agenda for the
49 next meeting to present a few ideas for a sculpture and possibly grant other area artists to do the
50 same. I feel it is of the utmost importance from a tourism and a pride level in this city that we
51 come up with something totally unique to Onalaska – something that is attractive and
52 sustainable, and puts us on the map.”

53

54 Erik called three times for anyone else wishing to provide public input and closed that portion of
55 the meeting.

56

57 **Consideration and possible action on the following items:**

58

59 **Item 4 – Update on Phase I of the Great River Landing Project**

60

61 Jarrod provided the following update:

62

- 63 • The warranty work on the roof will be finished by Friday, August 25.
- 64 • The trees were cut over a two-week period in August.
- 65 • Jarrod complimented Lee for his work at the site, noting that Lee has compiled a list of
66 warranty items such as the drinking fountain.
- 67 • Mayor Joe Chilsen and Ald. Bob Muth, who serves as Common Council President,
68 scheduled the site's grand opening for Saturday, August 26.

69

70 Dan addressed past questions regarding the site's electric bill and told committee members staff
71 is addressing those questions. The heating system in the restroom facility has an air handler that
72 heats the air during the winter months and cools it during the summer months. Dan said the
73 sensors were not functioning when someone was occupying the space. Therefore, the fans were
74 functioning nonstop. Dan noted he had made copies of the electric bill and said it was slightly
75 less than \$1,500 for the months of March and April. Dan said \$2,000 had been budgeted for the
76 year and told committee members that adjustments were made. There is electric heat in the
77 restrooms, and Dan said he anticipates costs to increase during the winter. However, Dan also
78 said he hopes the system will now function as desired. Dan said he believes that at a future date
79 a determination will need to be made regarding closing down the restrooms in the winter if costs
80 increase significantly during those months.

81

82 Dan formally introduced Lee, who is employed half-time at the Great River Landing. Dan also

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83 noted the city has assumed management of the Great River State Trail up to County Trunk
84 Highway Z and south to Enterprise Drive. Dan said Lee is attempting to beautify this area. Dan
85 also said he is requesting in the 2018 Budget that Lee's workload increase from 20 hours a week,
86 noting that Lee also maintains the flowers with Centering Onalaska.

87

88 Joe noted he had visited the site and had a question regarding the color of the men's room floor.

89

90 Jarrod said the floor is not supposed to be one shade.

91

92 **Item 5 – Update on WIFI capabilities for Great River Landing**

93

94 Mike said there have been complications with some of the Wi-Fi in the poles. The poles are
95 currently inactive, and Mike said he is unsure of the status. However, Mike said there is internet
96 in the trailhead facility, and there also is one access point in the building. The access point
97 covers the area of the trailhead facility and most of the deck. Mike said there are plans to add a
98 Capital Improvements Project in 2018 that would expand Wi-Fi in several of the city's buildings,
99 including the Great River Landing. This expansion would include improving coverage in the
100 existing areas as well as covering as much of the parking lot, green spaces and overlook as
101 possible.

102

103 John asked if there is internet access in the upper portion of the plaza area.

104

105 Mike said there is no internet access in the plaza. Mike also said that no matter how powerful a
106 device on a building is, it must deal with the power of an individual cell phone for the
107 communication back and forth. Mike told John the plan was to have Wi-Fi in the poles.
108 However, Mike also said that even if the poles are able to function, he doubts it will provide the
109 anticipated coverage. It will provide satisfactory coverage in the immediate plaza area
110 surrounding the poles, but the coverage surrounding the overlook will not be as strong. Mike
111 said the plan in the 2018 Capital Improvements Budget is to expand coverage by placing poles in
112 different locations in an attempt to improve coverage along the full area.

113

114 Jarrod noted that the lighting fixtures that include Wi-Fi capability were manufactured in Spain.
115 Jarrod said the city still is attempting to work with the manufacturer of the Wi-Fi unit inside the
116 pole because it is not licensed for use in the United States. Jarrod said Mike has been working
117 with Assistant City Engineer Kevin Schubert on this matter.

118

119 Mike noted he had not had an opportunity to examine the details of the Wi-Fi units ahead of
120 time, and he said it does not appear they will be able to support advanced features such as being
121 able to execute a handoff like a cell phone tower for a pedestrian walking across the area.
122 Rather, they would be individual. Mike said it appears the best course of action is to utilize
123 something else besides what is built into the poles.

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124
125 John asked if there still is a commitment to have Wi-Fi capabilities in the Main Street plaza.
126
127 Jarrod said yes, telling John there have been discussions about possibly attaching a unit to the
128 signal light post.
129
130 Joe asked how a Wi-Fi signal would reach the area by the sundial.
131
132 Mike said a unit would be placed on the far north edge of the building, and it would cover
133 partway up to the sundial. Mike noted there is power on the poles and said “mesh technology”
134 could be utilized. This means that instead of running network cable, the wireless access points
135 will communicate with each other to transfer the signal back to the building. Mike said that
136 while the speed is reduced, service will be continued farther out to the north – hopefully along
137 the entire overlook.
138
139 Jarrod said it would be mounted someplace such as to the backside of one of the columns. Jarrod
140 noted there is wire up to the plaza area and said the connection will be satisfactory.
141
142 Mike said coverage would need to be stretched out to the area north of the sundial as there are no
143 hard lines present.
144
145 John asked if the expansion would need to be part of the Capital Improvements Budget.
146
147 Jarrod said the 2018 CIB includes a line item for Wi-Fi expansion in various city buildings,
148 including City Hall, the Public Works Facility, Omni Center, and Great River Landing.
149
150 Joe inquired about the name of the network.
151
152 Mike said he has not yet activated the public network, noting the one he currently has permits
153 access to the security cameras (Lee is connected to this network). Mike said signs showing the
154 network’s name and password will be posted. Mike said he typically sets up networks with
155 security even if they are being made public because it secures each person’s connection.
156
157 **Item 6 – Review and consideration of Great River Landing Website**
158
159 Mike noted the current website was established some time ago and said there is no content
160 management system in place. Therefore, the only way to update the website is for someone to
161 write an html code. Mike said there are several options, with a lot depending on what to do with
162 the website, how frequently it is expected to be updated, and how much of a platform it should
163 be for promoting a project or the area itself. Mike said there are four basic options:
164

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- 165 • Mike said he is willing to do a one-time update to the existing html code.
166 • The website must be integrated into a content management system if there will be
167 continuing updates. Mike said annual costs would increase “somewhat,” but it should
168 remain less than \$500 a year.
169 • Hiring a web designer to redesign the site.
170 • Rather than moving the site to a new content management system specifically for the
171 Great River Landing, it could be hosted as a subpage of cityofonalaska.com. It could be
172 moved at no cost to a location where it could be updated.
173

174 Victor asked why the Great River Landing site could not be housed under Parks and Recreation.
175

176 Mike said it could.
177

178 Victor said that seems to be the most logical location.
179

180 Erik asked if cityofonalaska.com currently contains any information about the park at the Great
181 River Landing.
182

183 Victor said the press release regarding the ribbon-cutting ceremony is on the site.
184

185 Erik asked if there is a description about the park.
186

187 Dan noted there is information pertaining to the waterfront and said nothing about the new
188 development has been identified. Dan corrected himself and said there have been items under
189 Planning.
190

191 Katie said she believes there is information under Planning.
192

193 Erik suggested having information at cityofonalaska.com and point the url to that page and said
194 the information on the Great River Landing’s page is out of date and no longer serves a purpose.
195

196 Dan said the Omni Center has been brought under cityofonalaska.com, adding that anyone who
197 types in omniconter.net still can be directed to the Omni Center.
198

199 Mike said the Great River Landing domain name still can be pointed to that page.
200

201 Erik said that while he believes there should be further discussion about the website, he also is
202 uncertain if it is something that needs to be discussed at this committee level. Erik said, “If
203 we’re talking about doing private funding and philanthropy efforts to make things happen, there
204 may be a piece of that puzzle that may have value to have that on a standalone website.”
205

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206 Victor said he believes it is a bigger conversation about the organization of the website, adding
207 he believes Parks and Recreation needs to have links to each individual facility, and there also
208 should be photographs.

209

210 Jarrod said that in the short term the old site can be directed to Parks and Recreation and recent
211 photographs can be included.

212

213 **Item 7 – Review and consideration of public/private funding partnerships**

214

215 Erik said he had spoken with Mayor Chilsen, and he told committee members the two had
216 discussed having any formal structure to any private or public funding be established through the
217 Community Development Authority. Funding would be directed to a special account that is
218 established through the Onalaska Enhancement Foundation. Erik noted there is an existing
219 account within the OEF for the waterfront, and is specifically called “Waterfront Improvements.”
220 Erik said there have been no discussions at the CDA level, and it will be necessary to discuss this
221 with CDA Chairperson, Mike Gargaro. Erik said he will pursue this further.

222

223 John said the cost associated with a statue might end up being funded through the OEF.

224

225 **Item 8 – Consideration of 2018 Capital Improvements Budget related to the Great River**
226 **Landing, including, but not limited to:**

227

- 228 • Seating and/or Shade Structure(s) in Great River Landing Plaza Area;
- 229 • Interpretive Sign Panels (design & installation);
- 230 • Public Art (design & installation); and/or
- 231 • Projects detailed within Great River Landing Phasing Plan

232

233 Jarrod said the committee had decided at its July 14 meeting that the Main Street plaza was an
234 area on which to concentrate. Jarrod said the committee had decided not to pursue large-scale
235 projects in 2018. Jarrod addressed public art and said Joyce Diveley, who spoke during public
236 input, would like to be involved in the process. Jarrod said Ald. Bertrand has been working on
237 ideas for public art as well as gauging public sentiment. Jarrod said he does not believe public
238 art should be budgeted for in the 2018 CIB. Regarding interpretive sign panels, Jarrod said Katie
239 has been working on obtaining estimates from La Crosse Sign.

240

241 Katie said a previous intern had written options – some of which regarded the spillway, Lake
242 Onalaska, the history of the Great River Landing, the history of Onalaska – but no action was
243 taken at that time because staff wanted to see how visitors utilized the site and if there were
244 natural places visitors sat rather than placing the signs where committee members thought
245 visitors should go. Katie said she is seeking input from committee members as to whether they
246 would like her to pursue grant funding for interpretive signage. Katie said there would be up to

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247 five signs, and the quotes would be to design, manufacture and install all of the signs. Katie said
248 cost per sign would be approximately \$3,000.

249

250 For clarification, Erik asked Katie if she is seeking grants.

251

252 Katie told Erik there is an annual La Crosse Community Foundation grant and noted the
253 application deadline is approaching. Katie said she will draft the grant if it is a priority of the
254 Great River Landing Committee, Finance and Personnel Committee, and the Common Council,
255 adding that she hopes it would fund the entire project.

256

257 John said he believes it is important “to tell our story” in terms of the river and the city’s history.
258 John also said he believes “wordsmithing” becomes very important when the signs are created.

259

260 Victor suggested creating a subcommittee and seeking input from local historians and librarians,
261 who also could review the drafts of the language.

262

263 Erik noted there had been conversations during the charrette process with individuals “who may
264 serve a purpose in contributing to that project.” Erik suggested returning to those individuals for
265 input.

266

267 Victor asked if there had been any conversations with Badger State Industries and suggested
268 keeping that company in mind regarding the signage. Victor noted it is “inmate labor” and thus
269 more cost-efficient.

270

271 Jarrod noted that Katie will be seeking the design and the graphic art.

272

273 John said he still believes it is a priority of this committee to tell the story of Onalaska.

274

275 Erik said he supports applying for a grant.

276

277 Motion by John, second by Victor, to approve pursuing the grant process for interpretive signage
278 at the Great River Landing, and to direct city staff to follow the process.

279

280 John said he does not believe this project should be contingent upon obtaining a grant, stating, “It
281 has to happen one way or another. A grant would be nice, but this was real high on our original
282 plans. ... If it has to be funded out of the Capital Improvements Budget, so be it. But if we can
283 get grant money or whatever else to make it [much more cost-efficient], terrific.”

284

285 Jarrod suggested to committee members if they identify something they wish to request in the
286 2018 CIB, he would show what that request is, include the interpretive signage and show it in the
287 grant column. Funds can be reprioritized if the city does not receive the grant, meaning

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288 committee members would have to choose between, for example, interpretive signage or seating.

289

290 Erik asked for the estimated cost for signage.

291

292 Jarrod said it would be between \$15,000 and \$18,000.

293

294 Katie said the funds would need to be utilized in 2018 if the city receives the grant. Katie also
295 said the city will find out in late November if it has received the grant.

296

297 Erik inquired about the 2018 CIB.

298

299 Jarrod said the 2018 CIB will go before the Board of Public Works at its September 5 meeting.
300 The Board of Public Works will revise the 2018 CIB at its October 3 and November 7 meetings
301 and reduce it to approximately \$3.5 million. The 2018 CIB will go to public hearing at the
302 December 5 Board of Public Works meeting.

303

304 John, a former Onalaska School District Superintendent, noted that the La Crosse Community
305 Foundation was always generous toward the Onalaska Education Foundation. John said La
306 Crosse Community Foundation members were given tours and shown how funds would be spent
307 in the school district, and he suggested inviting a La Crosse Community Foundation member to
308 Onalaska so that the committee may share its ideas.

309

310 On voice vote, motion carried.

311

312 Jarrod addressed the Main Street plaza and said he has asked Short Elliott Hendrickson to
313 provide a list of potential projects. Jarrod began a PowerPoint presentation of possibilities:

314

- 315 • Jarrod noted the original bid included timber seating for the plaza, but was not pursued
316 due to the cost. Jarrod pointed out where such seating would be placed. Jarrod showed
317 committee members pictures of what the seating might look like. One option is a
318 Trapecio bench, which is supported by metal. Jarrod referred back to a diagram of the
319 plaza, pointed out possible locations for seating and said there could be up to seven
320 benches. Jarrod said the committee could pursue anywhere from one bench to seven
321 benches if its members approve of this option.
- 322 • Jarrod said another option would be to purchase tables and chairs.
- 323 • Jarrod showed committee members a photograph of a triangular shade structure, referred
324 back to the diagram of the plaza and showed where a shade structure could be placed.
- 325 • Jarrod said the architect had suggested installing a swing bench in a location where
326 visitors may overlook the lake and the spillway, and one by the fire pit.
- 327 • Jarrod said another option might be bird-watching binoculars.

328

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329 Jarrod referred to the seating unit cost summary and noted the original stacked wood seating was
330 bid at \$350,000. Jarrod said he believes “this is out of the realm of reality” of what the city can
331 fund. The following is the respective cost of the previously discussed items:

332

341

342 John asked Jarrod how much was removed from the original budget to pay for archaeology work.

343

344 Jarrod said slightly less than \$20,000 was budgeted for archaeology work in the original budget
345 and told John the final amount totaled \$114,000.

346

347 Erik asked Jarrod if he remembers how much funding was included for the 2017 CIB.

348

349 Jarrod said funding totaled nearly \$3.3 million and noted \$396,000 in Wisconsin Department of
350 Natural Resources grants was received. Jarrod estimated that funding for the 2017 CIB ended up
351 totaling approximately \$2.9 million.

352

353 Erik inquired about the amount of funding for the Great River Landing in the 2017 CIB.

354

355 Jarrod said \$50,000 was budgeted and approved for tree clearing.

356

357 Erik said he is unsure if the seating is portable.

358

359 Jarrod said it is not portable, noting it is mounted to the concrete.

360

361 Erik noted the committee had once discussed placing non-permanent seating in the plaza.

362

363 John referred to the photograph of the stacked wood seating option and said it seems as though
364 there is a significant amount of lumber that is only being utilized to build it up. John said he
365 does not disagree about making the seating portable, which hopefully will make maintaining this
366 area easier. John also asked committee members to realize that perhaps everything cannot be
367 done in one year.

368

369 Erik suggested that committee members go through the list and remove any items they know

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370 would be eliminated. Erik said it appears that interpretive signage is a priority and suggested
371 determining which item or items committee members wish to pursue and then prioritize them.

372

373 John said he is looking at the Trapecio benches and the swing benches. John said he believes the
374 shade structures cannot be included at this time and therefore should be eliminated, as should be
375 the tables and chairs.

376

377 Jarrod said a consultant can assist the city with the process and then more options can be
378 presented.

379

380 John reiterated his preference to install swings and benches.

381

382 Victor said he had immediately mentally eliminated the shade structures, umbrellas and chairs.
383 Victor also said compromises can be made on the number of benches and stated he would
384 advocate for the viewing binoculars.

385

386 Erik asked if the full use of the site is fully understood due to the repairs that have had to be
387 made there.

388

389 Jarrod said the committee can wait a year to decide what to do with the money, noting that
390 funding would be available in March 2019 if there is no funding for the Great River Landing in
391 the 2018 CIB.

392

393 John said he does not believe there is much risk in placing some seating at the site.

394

395 Erik said that even though the full capability of the site is not yet understood, everyone agrees
396 that the traffic and the use that was able to be done "has been great."

397

398 Dan expressed concern over possible vandalization of wooden benches.

399

400 Erik said skateboarders are another possible concern.

401

402 Dan said there have been issues with skateboarders at the Great River Landing. Dan also said
403 that while the look of wood is appealing, staff must be prepared to find ways to deal with
404 potential vandalism.

405

406 Jarrod noted that Dan will not be seeing an increase in his maintenance budget and said there is a
407 willingness to pay more for hard metal because it cannot be damaged as quickly.

408

409 John said the benches along the trail are attractive and asked how they are working out.

410

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411 Jarrod reminded committee members there will be 12 more meetings over the next 18 months to
412 decide what to put in if funding is obtained.

413

414 Dan suggested making seating the second option.

415

416 Jarrod said the cost of two swings would be \$18,000; the cost of four benches would be \$44,000;
417 and the cost of two viewing binoculars would be \$7,000. Jarrod noted the total would be
418 \$69,000 and asked committee members if that is a reasonable sum. Interpretive signage would
419 be \$18,000 and included even though the city will be applying for a grant, thereby bringing the
420 total to \$87,000.

421

422 John said a case could be made that that is approximately the amount that had to be spent for
423 archaeology work.

424

425 Dan suggested prioritizing the items.

426

427 Erik noted he had attended the July 24 Parks and Recreation Board meeting and said one board
428 member had stated that a boat dock would be of use due to the boat rentals taking place, and it
429 also is a great source of income.

430

431 Dan noted that Three Rivers Roleo Director Katie Rick had also attended the July 24 Parks and
432 Recreation Board meeting and said Three Rivers Roleo members have been “very active” in
433 requesting the installation of a dock so that a boom run may be held at the event.

434

435 Erik said someone else had stated boat docks and a pier to the spillway would be a popular
436 addition. Erik also referred to Victor’s comments regarding the sundial needing repairs and said
437 there is a possible donor for that. Erik also said Dan had suggested a water bottle filling station
438 and stated, “I think the plan the board was going to pursue is that they will have another
439 discussion about this at their meeting to get further input on that.”

440

441 Dan said cyclists, walkers and runners who utilize the trail have expressed interest in seeing a
442 water bottle filling station installed. Dan also said Lee has brought a water cooler from the Omni
443 Center to the Great River Landing so that individuals may fill up their water bottle.

444

445 John inquired about the cost of a water bottle filling station.

446

447 Dan said an indoor unit costs approximately \$4,200, but an outdoor unit that can be drained
448 likely will cost more – to be specific, an estimated \$5,000 to \$6,000.

449

450 Erik asked if this is an item that should be added to the list, noting there is slightly more than
451 \$3,400 in the OEF fund that is designated for improvements at the waterfront. Erik said he

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452 believes a water bottle filling station is a tourist item that would be of great value.

453

454 Jarrod said a \$6,000 grant had been secured to help pay for part of the aggregate for the
455 snowmobilers, adding he hopes to receive reimbursement by the end of the year and suggesting
456 there might be sufficient funding to purchase the water bottle filling station.

457

458 Joe said he believes the water bottle filling station should be a priority, adding he does not
459 believe the other items suggested by the Parks and Recreation Board should be brought forward
460 at this time.

461

462 Jarrod shared the list of items the committee is seeking:

463

- 464 • Water bottle filling station (\$7,000)
- 465 • Interpretive signage (\$18,000)
- 466 • Two swings (\$18,000)
- 467 • Four benches (\$44,000)
- 468 • Two pairs of binoculars (\$7,000)
- 469 • Total = \$94,000

470

471 Joe inquired about the green space.

472

473 Jarrod said the green space to which Joe had referred will remain.

474

475 Erik told committee members that Ald. Bertrand had pursued some renderings from artist
476 Michael Martino, who has created a number of sculptures in this area. Erik showed the
477 renderings to committee members, and he also showed them renderings of an eagle sculpture.
478 Erik said inquiries have been made as to which direction to take with this idea, stating, "They
479 feel that there is value to having some kind of a sculpture in the plaza area, and would like to
480 have feedback from this committee on how to pursue that further. There are other people who
481 could possibly be involved in this project. There could be private funding for it. [Ald. Bertrand]
482 wanted feedback from this committee."

483

484 John said he appreciates Ald. Bertrand's efforts and noted that Joyce has been part of the
485 renovation of downtown Onalaska for many years. John said he believes the committee should
486 respect Joyce's request to include this as a discussion item at the committee's next meeting.
487 John noted that there is an eagle sculpture at Riverside Park in the City of La Crosse and asked if
488 the City of Onalaska will be accused of copying that eagle. John suggested that perhaps an
489 alternative could be a sculpture honoring the logging industry.

490
